## A MESSAGE FROM OUR MODERATOR

Dear PW Sisters around the Synod of the Southwest,

I write this with a very full heart and prayers of thanksgiving for the work of PW across our Synod. Presbyterian Women have been very busy this fall. On September 30, the women in the Presbytery de Cristo held their fall gathering at Northminster Presbyterian Church in Tucson. We took a look at the 2023-24 *Horizons Bible study, Sacred Encounters, The Power and Presence of Jesus Christ in Luke-Acts*. As we contemplated Jesus' ministry and our call to share the love of Christ with our siblings living on the margins of society, we heard about *Youth on their Own*, a program supporting unsheltered youth to continue their education and move on with success. Then, on October 7 the women from the Presbytery of the Grand Canyon held their fall gathering at First Presbyterian Church in Mesa. International Peacemaker Angie Wuysang shared her vision of living in peace within a diverse community, with an emphasis on food ethics and environmental justice. We celebrated together in worship, completed hands-on mission activities, and shared current mission projects during the church roll call.

Along with the fall gatherings, our PW Synod of the Southwest also hosted the Presbyterian Women's USA Mission Experience to the Border Region. There were 18 Presbyterian Women from all over the country who gathered for the purpose of learning, experiencing, and accompanying mission partners, who support migrants on their immigration journey. I was honored and blessed to be able to participate in this opportunity. Also representing our Synod was Dodie Weiland, Moderator of PWP Grand Canyon, and Bonnie Thompson, Search Committee Chair for PW Board of Directors. This was a 10-day trip that took us from Phoenix to Agua Prieta, Mexico to Tucson and back to Phoenix. We shared in joyful worship and fellowship at Central Presbyterian Church, Southside Presbyterian Church and with the women from PW of Lirio de los Valles Presbyterian Church in Agua Prieta. We visited both sides of the border wall, spent time at the Children's Enrichment Program in Agua Prieta (a 2021 Thank Offering Grant recipient), participated in a prayer vigil for those who have perished crossing the desert in Cochise County, and connected with wonderful people and places, including mission partners of Frontera de Cristo and Casa Alitas (a migrant welcome center in Tucson). Each of these opportunities opened my eyes to the needs of our neighbors journeying with hope for a better life and also made me proud to be a Presbyterian Woman.

## Presbyterian Women's USA Mission Experience to Arizona and the Border Region

## October 13-23, 2023

I am with you now; I will protect you everywhere you go (Gen. 28:15, CEB) Presbyterian Women in Synods across the US selected sixteen women and two staff members to participate in the mission adventure. Women from Wyoming, Maryland, New York, Illinois, Iowa, Arizona, Washington, Minnesota, Mississippi, Florida, and Kentucky participated. They began in Phoenix with orientations with Rekha Nair, an immigration attorney, several migrant aid groups, a simulation called Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change: Toward Right Relationship with America's Native Peoples led Joan Fenton, and visits to Heard Museum and the Phoenix Botanical Gardens. On Sunday, we celebrated worship and a delightful lunch with our Indigenous Presbyterian sisters

and brothers at Central Presbyterian Church. Orientation continued with hands on mission activities and additional information about different refugee experiences and agencies.

## We then began to look forward to

our journey to the border, Frontera de Cristo, with insights from Dr. Catherine May. As the delegation arrived at the border, Douglas, Arizona, we were warmly greeted by Reverend Mark Adams, Reverend Jocabed Gallegos, a Presbyterian Mission Co-worker, and at the historic Gadsden Hotel for a lunchtime feast. Observations then began at the border wall with information, discussion, and reflection, followed by a healing prayer vigil to acknowledge migrants who died crossing the stark desert.

Next, we crossed the US/Mexico border easily into Agua Prieta. The following day we visited Cafe Justo, and the Children's Enrichment Site (a Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering Grant recipient). Lastly, we prepared tamales with lessons from the Presbyterian women of Lirios de los Valles and a glorious worship service. We were now ready to experience the border wall as migrants experience the thirty-foot steel and razor wired wall. Driving miles to a remote area on a ranch within a mile of the border wall, our hosts, Water for Life Ministry, took us to the tree of life, a large hickory tree with a water barrel beneath it. The mile long hot hike through the brutal desert to the wall showed us that the wall was eroded and easily climbed. Upon return to the tree, we celebrated with a delicious lunch provided by our hosts. Our day ended with discussions with migrants and dinner at the CAME Migrant Center. The next day, we concluded with a walk along the mural painted wall on the Agua Prieta, Mexico side of the border.

Crossing the border and driving to Tucson, Arizona, we met Dora Rodriguez to hear her personal story, the beginning of the sanctuary movement. The next day we toured Casa Alitas, a migrant welcoming center hosted by the Catholic Social Services. Following lunch, we met

at El Minuto restaurant in Tucson before the drive and departure in Phoenix the next day.





I was so proud to have played a small part, with the help of others, to welcome PW Synod representatives from around the nation to Phoenix and to learn with them greater detail on the history and status of both Native American and Migration issues. I want to personally thank:

**Joan Fenton** – for leading the Roots of Injustice, Seeds of Change workshop educating and emphasizing working toward right relationship with Native Peoples. If your PW or church group has not completed this exercise, I strongly recommend it!

**Rev. Martha Sadongei** for graciously inviting this group to share worship and fellowship at Central Presbyterian Church on Sunday, October 15, and

**Gina Enos** for hosting a wonderful lunch of flat bread tacos and fellowship that everyone loved!



Holly Herman and Selena Keesecker for helping me organize expert guest speakers and projects for a busy but impactful day of education and hands on ministry service on Monday, October 16th . We learned more on immigration history and policy (spoiler alert: this is <u>not</u> <u>a political issue</u> but a humanitarian crisis! Both parties have contributed and continue failed policies and procedures.) We met and heard from asylee experiences, and organizations that legally support humanitarian needs like Lutheran Social Services of Phoenix, Centro de Esperanza in Ajo, AZ, and SheltersforHope.com Sonyta, Sonoro MX. They gave us many ideas on how we can ALL do something to help as God uses each of us in unique ways.

This 10-day Mission Experience was far too impactful for me to go into detail in this short article. What I do know is that Chris Casanova, Bonnie Thompson, and I would love to work with all of you in this Synod to explore your PW interests and questions, customizing presentations to meet your needs and sharing so much more.

With Christmas approaching let me share just one example of something that may interest your PW. We all support children's education and help for those who want to remain in their home country (as most everyone does). In Aqua Prieta we visited the Children's Enrichment Ministry (CEM) who were the recipients of the 2021 PW Birthday Offering. We brought minor gifts, all we could fit in our van, in hopes that we could brighten a child's day. We learned how they serve children and families that live permanently in the Aqua Prieta area. These children go to school only half of the day as the schools are overcrowded and facilities limited. The rest of the day they would be left on their own were it not for CEM that offers both morning and afternoon sessions, feeding each group. CEM offers a Pastor for counseling and spiritual guidance. Volunteers from Frontera de Cristo visit to teach English.



They shared with us stories of the great need they see and how love can change the attitudes and learning capabilities of their children. We can all make a difference, even if it is to brighten just one child's day.

If you are curious about the blanket workshop, the Doctrine of Discovery, and about its history and the ongoing effects on native people, this gives you a glimpse of what you will experience: When we enter the area, we will hear flute music playing by world-renowned Navajo musician, R. Carlos Nakai. Our meeting space, covered with blankets, will have become Turtle Island, the name given by some native peoples to what is now called the United States. We will begin by meeting our four speakers: the European, the Historian, the Native American and the Narrator. Each speaker has a story to share; a part of our history to relate. We hear them speaking on Turtle Island, as they move us swiftly through 500 years of shared history, leaving us with a greater understanding of what we were and are, and perhaps planting seeds of ideas for improvement and change. At the end of the speakers' section, we will have time to discuss our reactions, and receive a seed of Mandan corn, the same corn that was grown in North Dakota Native communities.

We warmly invite you to Turtle Island, a place we've never been before, and one we will likely never forget.

## A Mission of Love and Necessity: Feminine Hygiene Kits for Haitians

Since 2018, many members and non-members of University Presbyterian Church in Tempe, AZ, have worked together to create feminine hygiene kits for distribution to impoverished girls and women through our mission

partners in Haiti, Harmony Ministries. These kits include reusable feminine hygiene supplies that assist young girls and women to better manage their menstrual periods. There were formerly no sustainable or affordable solutions for feminine hygiene for these girls and women. They had to stay at home during their periods and thus were precluded from going to school or engaging in work outside the home. The kits are distributed through Harmony Ministries along with a program on women's health education and health screenings. Harmony Ministries serves the poorest of the poor at four mission sites in Haiti—one in the poorest slums of Port-au-Prince and three rural communities that have no electricity or running water.

Pinnacle Peak Presbyterian Church in Scottsdale, AZ, offered us our initial introduction to this project and instruction in making the kits. We set a lofty goal of creating ten kits—which we barely met! Our numbers have grown from 10, to 25, to 50, to 80, to 100 twice, and the goal for this coming year is 200 kits.

Each complete kit contains two waterproof shields which hold the flannel pads (8 pads per kit), panties, soap, washcloth, use instruction and cycle tracking card, two Ziploc bags (the world's tiniest washing machine), all packed into a sewn drawstring bag. To meet this year's

goal, we will need to supply or make:

1600 two-ply flannel pads400 pairs of underwear200 washcloths200 small bars of soap



400-gallon size Ziploc bags 200 drawstring bags

We use donations of yards and yards of cotton fabric, money for flannel, washcloths, soap, serger thread, Ziploc bags, panties, and money for shipping costs. PW puts a portion of its mission budget toward this project. We continue to make wonderful use of a donated serger that has spread miles of thread. People have shared time and talent to prewash and press fabric; measure and cut cloth into various shapes and sizes; basting; sewing; serging; marking bags with exact measurements; assembling and sewing shields, bags, and pads; cutting and burning the ends of ribbons for the drawstring bags; and packing complete kits.

These are expensive to make and a lot of work. Yet, this is a labor of love. We shall continue!

This entire project has been filled with God moments! It takes the time, resources, and talents of so many people. Donated materials come from the most random sources. So many people have been involved. We started bringing sewing machines and sergers on campus to work together on the kits. But COVID-19 took away that option. People staying at home do need something meaningful to occupy their time. Our group organizer devised an assembly line procedure. The total kit making has been broken down into discrete tasks. Each task involves only one or up to ten actions, comes with a complete set of instructions, and is meted out according to the skills of the worker. Once one person completed a job, it was picked up and delivered to the next person in line. Now that COVID restrictions have lifted, we are still using a "work at home" model. The church is now the place to pick up tasks and drop off finished work. Training is joyfully provided as interest is shown.

You would think that just women would be involved. Oh, no! We have had a man use a jigsaw to cut a template for the shield pieces. One gentleman with Alzheimer's has become a loyal helper—as long as instructions are clearly provided. A high school student seeking service hours measured, cut and burned the ends of grosgrain ribbon to be drawstrings for the bags. A seven-year-old

boy working toward a Cub Scout ranking needed a mission project and connection with the church leader involved. His interview was eye-opening. He did a great job with measuring and cutting flannel and even machine sewed smaller flannel pieces to larger ones. Donations have come from as far away as Buffalo, NY. Our cotton scraps have moved on to become stuffing for dog beds in shelters and to a fabric recycling service that turns them into insulation. Our youth group helped stuff all components into the bags.

Pastor Luc and Ronide Deratus of Harmony Ministries in Haiti spoke with us on Sunday in April. We learned so much! Pastor Luc began sharing the history of how he felt his call, got seminary training, and returned to the poorest ghetto in Port-au-Prince to begin his ministry. What began with knocking on doors and getting two people to respond has grown into a main church that can seat 5000 and three satellite churches in the rural areas. The ministry includes worship as well as a medical clinic, primary schooling at all four sites, food and water assistance, feminine hygiene kit distributions, and much more.

From both, we learned volumes about the situation in Haiti. It is appallingly oppressive. Gangs, kidnappings, and corruption are very real concerns. The lack of safety keeps most people out of work and with very little access to the staples of life. No one has money. Prices are exorbitant. The mood is somber. Pastor Luc has kept the ministry going through hard work, creative and



resourceful thinking, the love of his people and total reliance on God. When asked if he saw any chance of improvement, his response was, "We must wait on God."



Ronide spoke with humor about the feminine hygiene kits. The women LOVE them! The components are comfortable and do a better job than any other thing they have tried. The panties they receive with the kits have them rapturous with

delight. Traditional supplies for one week would be about \$50. No one can afford this. The kits are a much better option. Distribution day for the feminine hygiene kits bring in more eager women than there are kits. It turns out that only UPC and a group in Scottsdale are making the kits for Harmony Ministries. Our continued participation in this activity is very much needed.

Major Takeaways:

- God's work is truly happening all over the earth.
- God's plan connects us into a kinship with some very extraordinary people.
- God's strength and omnipresence support people in dire situations.
- Even in the worst of situations, humor can abound. We could make 1000 feminine hygiene kits per year and maybe begin to meet the need in Haiti.
- Pastor Luc and Ronide are fabulous people—and people of God. •

## **Taking on Domestic Violence**



You sense there is a problem in someone's relationship, but what can you do?

Ask questions such as these: Do you feel safe at home? Are you ever scared of your partner? Does he/she put you down, call you names, hit or push you? Does he keep you from doing things you want to do? If she is reluctant to answer, tell her you will talk or help when she is ready. These questions are appropriate to ask of teens and elderly persons also.

Now what? Your positive actions will open the door to future opportunities for her.

- 1. Believe her! She may have few people who do.
- 2. Reassure her that abuse is not God's will, and that she doesn't deserve it. Encourage her to think about making a safety plan, putting aside documents, money, and other essentials in a safe location.
- 3. Keep your conversations with her confidential.
- 4. At all times, respect her decisions, even if you disagree with them. What she does is aimed at keeping her safe.
- 5. Remind yourself that there is usually a lag between the time a victim receives information and the time she feels ready to act on it. The moment that she leaves is the most dangerous and possible lethal for her, and for children, if any.

DO NOT talk to her partner- Talking with him will endanger her. Don't tell her she must leave him immediately. NEVER recommend couples' counseling. Don't blame her or encourage her to return to her partner.

More Now What?

Do you feel your congregation, session, deacons, and pastor are supportive of victims through worship sermons, education and other actions meant to convey compassion and accountability to abusers? Are teens offered classes in healthy dating relationships? Is your church a resource toward achieving healthy relationships for all ages? Are elderly, home-bound members visited with a plan to discern if elder abuse or neglect is happening?


